'Voices for Change': Integration reality examined in NICEM report¹

A report into the experiences of community members from black and ethnic minority backgrounds living in Northern Ireland has been released by the Northern Ireland Council for Ethnic Minorities as part of a major European project examining the integration reality of life here.

NICEM Executive Director, Patrick Yu, stated that

"It is the first report of this kind and includes detailed regional focus across Northern Ireland with the participation of 650 respondents on five key integration indicators including employment."

Mr Uwem Otong from Nigeria, spoke at the launch to draw attention to employment barriers to the integration process:

"Third Country National migrant workers continue to come to the UK under the pretence of 'training opportunities' promoted by overseas employers - they leave their countries in trust and then realise there was never any job to go to. Therse are local and national issues that must take the European and international context into account. If no positive action is taken by government towards integration realities then young people will live and grow in anger."

This report was commissioned as a response to the lack of existing community-led action research and the recent consultation on a revised Racial Equality Strategy in the wake of the mass demonstration 'March Against Racism' in Summer 2014 that attracted almost 8,000 supporters.

Geraldine Scullion, a co-author of the report, stresses the **need for action from government departments** to be proactive in supporting integration:

"Members of NI's BME community and migrant workers make an enormous contribution to the economy and society in NI which is not recognised or celebrated; the barriers which hinder their full integration - under-utilisation of their qualifications, skills and experience, the perpetuation of erroneous myths and stereotypes, racial bullying of children in schools, or the fear of racist attacks – must be addressed by the authorities in order for their potential to be fully realised.'
